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Howey-in-the-Hills Town Council Seat 2* (Vote for One)	No. 1 Constitutional Amendment, Article VII, Section 6, Article XII, Section 37
Martha MacFarlane Edward E. Smith	Increased Homestead Property Tax Exemption Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to increase the homestead exemption by exempting the assessed valuation of homestead property greater than \$100,000 and up to \$125,000 for all levies other than school district levies. The amendment shall take effect January 1, 2019.
Howey-in-the-Hills Town Council Seat 3* (Vote for One)	No. 2 Constitutional Amendment, Article XII, Section 27
Ed Conroy H. Don Ellis	Limitations on Property Tax Assessments Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to permanently retain provisions currently in effect, which limit property tax assessment increases on specified nonhomestead real property, except for school district taxes, to 10 percent each year. If approved, the amendment removes the scheduled repeal of such provisions in 2019 and shall take effect January 1, 2019.
Leesburg City Commissioner Seat 5, At Large* (Vote for One)	No. 3 Constitutional Amendment, Article X, Section 29
Donald Lukich Dan Robuck III	Voter Control of Gambling in Florida This amendment ensures that Florida voters shall have the exclusive right to decide whether to authorize casino gambling by requiring that in order for casino gambling to be authorized under Florida law, it must be approved by Florida voters pursuant to Article XI, Section 3 of the Florida Constitution. Affects articles X and XI. Defines casino gambling and clarifies that this amendment does not conflict with federal law regarding state/tribal compacts.
Mount Dora City Council At Large* (Vote for One)	No. 4 Constitutional Amendment, Article VI, Section 4
Kate Bellamy Crissy Stile Donnie Stroud	Voting Restoration Amendment This amendment restores the voting rights of Floridians with felony convictions after they complete all terms of their sentence including parole or probation. The amendment would not apply to those convicted of murder or sexual offenses, who would continue to be permanently barred from voting unless the Governor and Cabinet vote to restore their voting rights on a case by case basis.
Tavares City Council Seat 3* (Vote for One)	No. 4 Constitutional Amendment, Article VI, Section 4
Roy Stevenson Robert Wolfe	The amendment's impact on state and local government revenues and costs, if any, cannot be determined at this time because of its unknown effect on gambling operations that have not been approved by voters through a constitutional amendment proposed by a citizens' initiative petition process.
Arlington Ridge Community Development District Board of Supervisors, Seat 4* (Vote for One)	No. 4 Constitutional Amendment, Article VI, Section 4
Dee Bloch Roy Craddock Claire Murphy	The precise effect of this amendment on state and local government costs cannot be determined, but the operation of current voter registration laws, combined with an increased number of felons registering to vote, will produce higher overall costs relative to the processes in place today. The impact, if any, on state and local government revenues cannot be determined. The fiscal impact of any future legislation that implements a different process cannot be reasonably determined.

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No. 5 Constitutional Amendment, Article VII, Section 19
<p>Supermajority Vote Required to Impose, Authorize, or Raise State Taxes or Fees</p> <p>Prohibits the legislature from imposing, authorizing, or raising a state tax or fee except through legislation approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature in a bill containing no other subject. This proposal does not authorize a state tax or fee otherwise prohibited by the Constitution and does not apply to fees or taxes imposed or authorized to be imposed by a county, municipality, school board, or special district.</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">No</p>
No. 6 Constitutional Revision, Article I, Section 16, Article V, Sections 8 and 21, Article XII, New Section
<p>Rights of Crime Victims; Judges</p> <p>Creates constitutional rights for victims of crime; requires courts to facilitate victims' rights; authorizes victims to enforce their rights throughout criminal and juvenile justice processes. Requires judges and hearing officers to independently interpret statutes and rules rather than deferring to government agency's interpretation. Raises mandatory retirement age of state justices and judges from seventy to seventy-five years; deletes authorization to complete judicial term if one-half of term has been served by retirement age.</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">No</p>
No. 7 Constitutional Revision, Article IX, Sections 7 and 8, Article X, New Section
<p>First Responder and Military Member Survivor Benefits; Public Colleges and Universities</p> <p>Grants mandatory payment of death benefits and waiver of certain educational expenses to qualifying survivors of certain first responders and military members who die performing official duties. Requires supermajority votes by university trustees and state university system board of governors to raise or impose all legislatively authorized fees if law requires approval by those bodies. Establishes existing state college system as constitutional entity; provides governance structure.</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">No</p>
No. 9 Constitutional Revision, Article II, Section 7, Article X, Section 20
<p>Prohibits Offshore Oil and Gas Drilling; Prohibits Vaping in Enclosed Indoor Workplaces</p> <p>Prohibits drilling for the exploration or extraction of oil and natural gas beneath all state-owned waters between the mean high water line and the state's outermost territorial boundaries. Adds use of vapor-generating electronic devices to current prohibition of tobacco smoking in enclosed indoor workplaces with exceptions; permits more restrictive local vapor ordinances.</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">No</p>
No. 10 Constitutional Revision, Article III, Section 3, Article IV, Sections 4 and 11, Article VIII, Sections 1 and 6
<p>State and Local Government Structure and Operation</p> <p>Requires legislature to retain department of veterans' affairs. Ensures election of sheriffs, property appraisers, supervisors of elections, tax collectors, and clerks of court in all counties; removes county charters' ability to abolish, change term, transfer duties, or eliminate election of these offices. Changes annual legislative session commencement date in even-numbered years from March to January; removes legislature's authorization to fix another date. 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No. 11 Constitutional Revision, Article I, Section 2, Article X, Sections 9 and 19
<p>Property Rights; Removal of Obsolete Provision; Criminal Statutes</p> <p>Removes discriminatory language related to real property rights. Removes obsolete language repealed by voters. Deletes provision that amendment of a criminal statute will not affect prosecution or penalties for a crime committed before the amendment; retains current provision allowing prosecution of a crime committed before the repeal of a criminal statute.</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">No</p>
No. 12 Constitutional Revision, Article II, Section 8, Article V, Section 13, Article XII, New Section
<p>Lobbying and Abuse of Office by Public Officers</p> <p>Expands current restrictions on lobbying for compensation by former public officers; creates restrictions on lobbying for compensation by serving public officers and former justices and judges; provides exceptions; prohibits abuse of a public position by public officers and employees to obtain a personal benefit.</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">No</p>
No. 13 Constitutional Revision, Article X, New Section, Article XII, New Section
<p>Ends Dog Racing</p> <p>Phases out commercial dog racing in connection with wagering by 2020. Other gaming activities are not affected.</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">No</p>
City of Eustis Charter Amendment #1 Article III, Section 3*
<p>Qualifications of candidates.</p> <p>Recent court cases have determined two year residency requirements like the City's current residency requirement are illegal. A one year residency requirement is legal. Umatilla Ordinance 2018 - F Ballot Question Number 1:*
<p>Office of the Mayor.</p> <p>Under the current Charter, the Mayor is the titular head of City government, but cannot vote at Council meetings; meanwhile, the Council chooses a President and Vice-President from among themselves to preside and vote at meetings. This amendment combines offices, abandoning the titles "President" and "Vice-President" and establishing Council elected Mayor and Vice-Mayor, providing all elected Council members the authority to vote at Council meetings.</p> <p>Shall the above-described amendment be adopted?</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">No</p>

<p>Primary Election Held In The Event More Than Two Candidates Qualify For Any One Seat</p> <p>Shall Article III, Section 3.03, Charter of Groveland be amended to provide that in the event more than two candidates qualify for any one seat on city council a primary election shall be held with the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes cast to stand for election so that a candidate must receive more than fifty percent of the votes cast in order to prevail?</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">No</p>

<p>Filling The Seat Of Mayor When Vacated Prior To Expiration Of Term Of Office</p> <p>Should the Charter of Groveland be amended to provide that if the seat of mayor becomes vacant prior to expiration of the mayor's term of office then the vice-mayor will fill the mayor seat for the remainder of the unexpired term rather than for a full two year term?</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">No</p>

<p>Limitations On Interference With City Administration By City Council</p> <p>Should the Charter of Groveland be amended to delete the requirement for the city manager to notify the council in writing in advance of appointing or removing department heads or other employees; delete the ability of Council to closely scrutinize by personal observation all aspects of city government operations; and add the ability of council members to ask questions and seek information from City staff to assist Council in formulating policies?</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">Yes</p> <p style="margin-left: 20px;">No</p>
